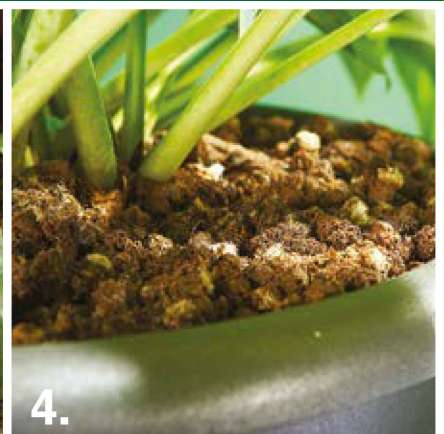

WHAT IS SLUG GONE

Slug Gone Wool Pellets are completely natural and are made entirely from wool.

HOW DOES SLUG GONE WORK

The swollen wool pellets form a felt – like mat that absorbs moisture from the slug's foot, thereby making it difficult for the slug to travel across. This wool pellet mat also contains abrasive particles which irritate the slug's foot, physically deterring the slug and creating a 100% natural barrier.

HOW TO USE

Individual plant - place Slug Gone pellets in a 10cm circular band around the base of the plant.

Group of plants - protect an area place the pellets in a continuous band circling the plants.

For pots and baskets - spread enough pellets to cover the containers entire surface to the edge.

Make sure not to leave any gaps.

Once the pellets have are in place, water generously. The pellets will expand and bind together to form a mat.

Slug Gone is long lasting, when no longer required the pellets can be left to biodegrade or can be worked into the soil.

Note: Some pets may be attracted to the natural wool pellets. Whilst eating Slug Gone will not normally cause a problem, it should be discouraged and, if necessary, measures taken to restrict access to areas where Slug Gone has been applied.
